Purpose

The purpose of this course is to review the major areas of developmental psychology across the life span. These topics will include biological, cognitive, social, and emotional development.

The specific objectives of the course are to:

- 1. Identify the different aspects of human psychological development.
- 2. Discuss major theories of developmental psychology.
- 3. Apply an understanding of theory to the analysis of research findings.
- 4. Correlate theory and research findings to real-world experiences of humans at different stages of development.

Course Materials

- Textbook: Life Span Development: A Topical Approach, 3rd edition by Robert S. Feldman
- **MyDevelopmentLab**: Course content is available in the <u>Canvas website</u>, which will provide links to the MyDevelopmentLab website. You are required to be able to access the MyDevelopmentLab website, which has material to assist you in mastering the material and chapter tests required for the course.

Course Organization

The course is organized in weekly modules (Note: These modules do not always match the chapter numbers). For each chapter there are supplemental assignments designed to elaborate on selected topics within each. They can include:

- Canvas video lectures (with accompanying PowerPoint slides) by the instructor;
- MyDevelopmentLab Chapter tests; and
- MyDevelopmentLab media activities, simulations, and videos.
- Discussion Topics

This material will be covered on the exams.

Course Requirements

1. Chapter Tests (30% of grade): There is a chapter test in MyDevelopmentLab for each chapter.

- 2. **Exams (35% of grade)**: There are three exams, proctored online using ProctorU, which consist of multiple choice and short answers:
 - Exam 1 covers Chapters 1, 2, 3, and 5.
 - Exam 2 covers Chapters 6, 7, 8, 9, and 10.
 - Exam 3 covers Chapters 11, 12, 13, 14, and 15.
- 3. **MyDevelopmentLab Media Assignments (5% of grade)**: Each chapter has assignments from MyDevelopmentLab consisting of videos and interactive exercises. Additional non-graded material from MyDevelopmentLab can also assist you in learning the material.
 - o NOTE: Each chapter in MyDevelopmentLab also has a Chapter Test that is REQUIRED.
- 4. **Discussion Activities (10% of grade)**: There are a series of short discussions activities assigned for selected chapters designed to foster understanding of important concepts. Each discussion topic will require a short written response (less than a page).
- 5. **Projects (20% of grade)**: There are four written projects designed to explore certain topics in more depth and/or designed to enhance your understanding of particular topics. Each Project should be about 2-4 pages (double space in length).
 - o **Papers must be submitted to Turnitin.com**. Plagiarism will be reported to the university and will become part of your academic record.

Course Deadline and Extension Policy

Students are allowed 16 weeks, from their date of enrollment, to complete and submit their coursework. If the student has not submitted at least 50% of their coursework and have an extenuating circumstance preventing them from submitting the coursework, a failing grade of "E", "E0" or "E1" will be issued and recorded to the UF Registrar.

If the student has made sufficient academic progress, which is defined as completing and submitting at least 50% of the coursework and have an extenuating circumstance, the student may petition the instructor for a course extension before the course expires. Each course extension request will be administratively evaluated. Instructors are not required to allow extensions. If a student does receive an extension, an incomplete grade of an "I" will be assigned as an interim grade. When the course is completed, the instructor will initiate the change of grade. After that, the "I" grade will be changed to the student's final course grade on their transcript.

A Course Cancel:
